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From its inception in 1999, the Greater Nashville Technology Council has been a catalyst for the growth and influence of Middle Tennessee's tech sector. Initially, the NTC was housed in the Nashville Area Chamber of Commerce. It provided job market studies and hosted events that were relevant to tech companies and IT departments. By 2008, the organization helped to establish the Nashville Angel Network (later the Nashville Capital Network) and the Nashville Entrepreneur Center, and launched the NTC Awards.

In 2015, the organization received a state grant to fund the IT Pathway Collaborative to address the IT skills gap in the region. That project spurred programs to raise student awareness of tech career opportunities through camps, after school programs, tech industry field trips, and the creation of the We Build Tech platform, a network of training and employment tools to help create a tech talent pipeline for Nashville.

Through Comcast's remarkable investment and the support of numerous organizations in our tech community, Tech Hill Commons opened its doors in early 2017 and became the new home of the NTC. It has already served as a gathering spot for thousands in the tech community.

In late 2017, the NTC continued its focus on building new avenues into tech opportunities with the announcement of Apprenti TN, a technology-focused apprentice program and the first of its kind in Tennessee. The program has attracted hundreds of diverse apprentice applicants and will launch its first cohort of students in late 2018.

LETTER FROM THE CEO

This past year brought many significant signs and outcomes that highlight the strength and vitality of the Middle Tennessee technology sector. Jobs are on the rise, our education system is more focused on STEM initiatives, and we continue to raise our national profile as a desirable destination for technology-dependent companies looking to expand or relocate from other parts of the globe.

At the heart of our success is a regional creative culture that fosters an ideal environment for growth and innovation. The greater Nashville area is a welcoming, cooperative ecosystem that actively nurtures both new and existing tech businesses. We are a magnet for new tech talent from other markets and are aggressively expanding our own tech

Our tech workforce is on the rise and currently stands at 46,099 workers. This represents a 30% increase in the past five years, outpacing national tech job growth by 10% and general Middle Tennessee job growth by 15% over the same period. The median income for a Middle Tennessee tech worker is 96% higher than the average Middle Tennessee worker. All of this adds up to an economic impact of more than \$6 billion for our region. The technology sector spans all our major industries and serves as the enabling force driving innovation and growth in healthcare, music and entertainment, manufacturing, finance and others.

This year, we also completed our first full year at Tech Hill Commons, the NTC's community event center and office space. We welcomed 449 individual events to Tech Hill Commons, bringing in more than 12,000 visitors. From product launches to developer meetups and networking events, Tech Hill Commons has become the living room, conference room, classroom, and auditorium for Middle Tennessee's tech community.

Our advocacy and public affairs efforts continue to expand and bring new value to our members. This year we added two registered lobbyists to work on behalf of our members and achieved early legislative wins as described in the Public Policy & Advocacy section of this report.

I'm happy to report that Apprenti TN, our new tech apprenticeship program, officially launched in June of 2018 and is already showing encouraging results. Within the first several weeks we saw more than 300 people take the aptitude assessment, the first step of the apprentice application process. Half of the applicants taking the assessment scored 80% or better, qualifying them for the interview phase. Of those who took the assessment, 63% were people of color, 43% were veterans and 24% were female. We clearly have an opportunity to leverage this program to build a more inclusive tech workforce.

These are just a few of the stories highlighted in this year's report. Thanks to an incredible NTC Team and supportive board of directors, we are leading the growth and influence of Middle Tennessee's tech community.




FINANCES

MIDDLE TENNESSEE'S **TECH JOBS LANDSCAPE**


This year brings with it the ability to analyze the tech workforce in Middle Tennessee as never before. In partnership with the NTC, Middle Tennessee State University has procured access to in-depth workforce development data, and used it to produce a comprehensive report on the local tech workforce. Collaboration on this report allowed us to create a tailored definition of "creative tech" for the greater Nashville area; one that is truly reflective of our local tech community. This definition encompasses not only traditional tech occupations, but also analytics occupations that lie at the intersection of tech, mathematics, and business. It also captures the tech workers that fuel industries – like healthcare and entertainment – that serve as the economic backbone of our region.

This detailed analysis gives us the ability to see the existing landscape clearly. This knowledge provides exciting opportunities to create workforce development strategies that leverage our regional strengths while developing thoughtful, data-driven programs that foster the ideal environment for growth.

- / The Middle Tennessee tech median compensation is **96% higher** than the Middle Tennessee median for all jobs
- / Middle Tennessee tech job growth outpaced the national tech job growth by 10% from 2012 to 2017
- / Middle Tennessee tech/analytics jobs outpaced general Middle Tennessee job growth by 15% from 2012 to 2017

/ The rate of Middle Tennessee tech job growth is projected to outpace the rate of national tech job growth by **78%** between 2017 and 2022.

From 2012-2017, Middle Tennessee tech workers grew by 30% to a total of 46,099. The median income for tech occupations is \$71,370, which is 96% higher than the median income across all occupations in Middle Tennessee. This rate of growth outpaces national tech job growth by 10% and general Middle Tennessee job growth by 15%. The Middle Tennessee tech workforce growth is projected to outpace national tech workforce growth by 78% over the next five years.


VOLUNTEERISM

PROGRAM SPOTLIGHTS

As a key component to the Greater Nashville Technology Council's mission, we build programs to help our members develop the skills they need to better achieve their goals and advance their careers. The NTC works with our members to build programs in targeted areas of concentration to serve the needs of the community.

In 2017-2018, the NTC became a platform and successfully launched three new groups including the ELITE program, the Veterans Peer Group, and Nash DevOps, which collectively worked to "level-up" 750+ professionals in the Middle Tennessee tech community.

VISION & PURPOSE

As the technical talent pool grows, our tech community must continue to build leadership talent that will attract, retain, and strengthen the talent required for Nashville to be a recognized leader in technology. Through the Emerging Leaders in IT (ELITE) program, the NTC is making an investment in developing technologists and equipping them with the knowledge and connections to be successful in a technology leadership role.

"The mission of the NTC is to grow, attract, and retain tech talent in Nashville. We all know that people join companies and leave their bosses. The ELITE program was created to develop leaders in the tech community with a solid foundation that attracts and inspires talent," said Joanne Eckton, a member of the Leadership Committee and an instrumental force in launching the program.

The six-month, application-only program provides an opportunity for both experienced and aspiring leaders to come together to collectively gain new skills, share knowledge, and build Nashville's leadership pool in the tech industry. Through formal instruction, community program activities, dialogue, and executive mentoring, the ELITE program provides information on the core skills required for people leadership and opportunities to use and refine those skills.

"The NTC ELITE program provided a tremendous opportunity to network with other rising IT leaders in the metro-Nashville area while also learning from highly-experienced IT leaders who served as mentors," said Marcus Magee of Tractor Supply, who participated in the inaugural cohort. "I have used the skills learned during NTC ELITE to aide in my personal career development, which has translated into a new role within my company and me leading the effort to establish a partnership between my company and a local college."

In addition to classroom training and a team-based, community project that participants must scope and execute, the program also includes a mentorship component designed to help emerging leaders connect with and learn from experienced Executive Mentors. Twenty-two Executive Mentors attend every other session with the participants and serve as sounding boards and subject matter experts as the cohort completes exercises designed to put their leadership skills into action.

"Being a mentor is great in a variety of ways — an opportunity to share experiences, to learn from each other, to talk strategy and understand operational challenges," said Nicole Tremblett of HCA, who also serves as an Executive Mentor. "It's been my pleasure to be part of this wonderful program."

NTC VETERANS PEER GROUP AND MENTORSHIP PROGRAM

VISION & PURPOSE

The NTC Veterans Peer Group began as a small group of technology-minded leaders. The group strives to evolve to meet the needs of professionals in the rapidly-changing tech industry as business leaders, entrepreneurs, or transitioning veterans. The NTC Veterans Peer Group was founded to support veterans in all areas of technology. This group provides a forum for Nashville veterans to empower each other in technology through education, mentoring, and networking.

The peer group creates an inclusive environment for non-veterans and veterans alike to share in their passion for technology and veteran causes. Its members provide technology leadership to veterans in the corporate arena as entrepreneurs or currently in transition from the service.

The group provides leaders in technology an opportunity to mentor, network, and encourage veterans to pursue careers in technology in Middle TN. "We want Nashville to be a veteran-friendly city with veteranfriendly businesses at the heart of it all," said Bob Costello of Kirklands, who has been an instrumental part of the planning committee.

The NTC Veteran Peer Group is supported, planned, and run by Bob and Jon Zagami of Bedroc, who work in coordination with an Executive Committee. "Our Executive Committee has a passion for technology and servant leadership," said Jon, which has enabled the program to launch not only a series of guarterly events but also the unique Veteran's Mentorship Program.

The NTC Veteran's Mentorship Program allows veterans to model good leadership and offer practical guidance to their future leaders. Mentoring fosters not only professional growth but also personal growth, and can develop confidence in handling new situations, improve understanding of different approaches, and enhance self-esteem for both mentors and mentees.

Through small group mentorship, this program seeks to provide veterans with an opportunity for valuable peer-to-peer learning, professional development, and meaningful connections within the Middle Tennessee tech community. Participation is limited to veterans working in, or interested in working in, the tech industry.

"There's so much value in peer-to-peer relationship and peer-to-peer information sharing...it's often times the conversation with our colleagues in a group format where we learn the most," said Sean Tuley, CIO of LifePoint Health and Executive Committee member, who also serves as a program mentor. "The small group approach allows us to have a different dynamic than a traditional one-on-one mentor relationship, and facilitates each of the mentees of the program contributing to the overall learning of the group," Sean continued. "This program not only allows Nashville technology professionals who are veterans to connect in a meaningful way and promote their careers, but the participants in this first cohort are putting their fingerprints on what could be a long-term mentorship opportunity in the Middle Tennessee area for many vears to come."

In October 2017, Nash DevOps peer group leaders organized and engaged 275 attendees for Nashville's DevOpsDays with industry leaders chosen as Keynote Speakers including John Willis, Co-Author of The DevOps Handbook & DevOps Cafe Podcast host, Andrew Clay Shafer, integral in forming the DevOps movement and Co-Founder of Puppet & Michael Cote, Podcast host for Software-Defined Talks & Pivotal Podcasts.

NASH DEVOPS PEER GROUP

VISION & PURPOSE

The Nash DevOps Peer Group was started by Nick Wallace, Solutions Architect for Red Hat, and Steve Stewart, Sales Account Executive, Shadow-Soft, with the intent to build a DevOps community in Middle Tennessee. The group is for IT professionals looking to provide better solutions by unifying software development (Dev) and software & infrastructure operations (Ops) to share their knowledge and lessons learned.

The DevOps movement strongly advocates for automation and monitoring at all steps of software construction. This culture focuses on agility and increasing efficiency through feedback loops to strive for continuous improvement and enhance the end-user experience. DevOps aims to achieve shorter development cycles more rapidly, in close alignment with business.

"Nash DevOps a community of collaboration," explains Stewart. "New attendees will find and should be ready to participate in conversations with experts about a wide-range of topics."

Besides developers and operations, DevOps brings together a wide array of professionals including C-suite, executive leaders, project and product managers, architects, business intelligence, data scientists, engineers, administrators, technical recruiting agencies, start-ups, educators and students, charitable volunteers, and technology enthusiasts. Almost every industry vertical in Nashville is represented including: health care and life sciences, insurance, manufacturing, financial services and banking, retail, gaming, state government, publishing, entertainment. tourism and research.

"Nash DevOps has been hosting meetings for some time at Tech Hill Commons," said Wallace. "We're excited for the NTC to be a platform to grow the DevOps community in Middle Tennessee."

Relaunched with a new and energized advisory board, hosting 4 events throughout the year, reaching 122 participants, on topics such as multilevel selling, cross-industry tech sales, and leveraging social media for B2B selling.

NASH DEVOPS PEER GROUP

// MISSION

To create a collaborative community for cross-functional technology professionals passionate about the DevOps culture. To nurture a group professionals that meets regularly who are looking to provide better IT solutions through the unification of software development (Dev) and software & infrastructure operations (Ops) and willing to share their knowledge and lessons learned.

// ACCOMPLISHMENTS

Since forming Nash DevOps in January 2016, the peer group has grown to 640 members, hosted **30** monthly meetings with **50** regular attendees. Successfully organized and engaged 275 at the Nash DevOps Days at the Bell Tower in October 2017.

COMMUNITY EVENTS

The NTC's Community Events are opportunities to bring varied segments of the Nashville tech community together to network, build relationships, and share ideas. The mission is to get to know each other, have fun, and learn a thing or two in the process.

We hosted 74 events throughout the year with 6,219 total event registrations.

NASHCOCKTAIL & NTC FEATURED MEMBER OF THE MONTH

In April 2017 the Nashville Technology Council took ownership of NashCocktail, Nashville's premier monthly networking event for the tech community. On the second Tuesday of every month, **65-80** people from a wide range of companies, industries, and backgrounds gather to connect, socialize, and build relationships.

More than **770** people attended NashCocktail events throughout the year, giving us a chance to introduce a new and expanded audience to the tech council's work and the Tech Hill Commons venue.

When the NTC opened the doors to Tech Hill Commons, we launched the new NTC Featured Member of the Month program, inviting NTC Members to join us in the space for a month, connecting with the more than **1,000** monthly visitors, underwriting and hosting that month's NashCocktail event, and receiving customized promotion through our online communication channels. We limit the Featured Member spotlight to include just two members each month, ensuring strong exposure for each brand.

THE NTC HOLIDAY & SUMMER PARTIES

Our two annual community events connect our members and collectively celebrate the growth and influence of Nashville's technology community. A crowd of **358** came together in December at Tennessee Brew Works for a sold-out night of networking and fun, while another **242** people gathered at MAFIAoZA'S Franklin in June to celebrate the close of the NTC's fiscal year.

TECH TALKS

The NTC Tech Talk series offers monthly 'lunch and learn' style events where members of the Nashville tech community come together to hear from those people and companies who are driving change and leading innovation in their fields.

Throughout the year, the NTC hosted 12 tech talks on topics ranging from moving a healthcare company to the public cloud to scaling a SaaS startup to AI and bot governance structures, and reached 507 total event attendees.

The Nashville Analytics Summit was created by NTC members and is one of Nashville's largest locallygrown analytics events in the region. The NTC works to unite the Middle Tennessee business community in an effort to create and sustain a political and economic atmosphere that empowers technological innovation to thrive in our region. We advocate for policies that nurture tech industry expansion and attract strong talent.

ADVOTECH PROGRAMMING

The AdvoTECH event series provides an opportunity to discuss public policy issues with experts and policymakers to educate, identify stakeholders, and build relationships.

- The NTC hosted eight AdvoTECH events bringing together more than 525 members of the tech community and policy makers.
- AdvoTECH programming educated our members on topics including Internet access, software as a service taxation, public transit, and consumer data protection compliance and GDRP.
- The NTC, in coalition with Launch Tennessee, Life Sciences Tennessee, and EO Nashville, host more than 250 tech leaders and Tennessee state legislators at the first combined legislative reception as a Celebration of Entrepreneurship & Innovation at the Musician's Hall of Fame.
- Empowered more than 90 engagements between NTC members and Tennessee State Legislators during the NTC Hill Day.
- / Hosted a three-day DC fly-in program to connect with tech policy leaders and host more than 56 engagements with NTC members, members of Congress, and their staffs to discuss workforce development.
- Hosted NTC's first Gubernatorial Candidate Forum with a speed-dating format ahead of the primaries as an opportunity for NTC members to connect directly with the candidates.
- Hosted early voting lunch ahead of the Transit for Nashville vote to help NTC members get to the polls.

STATE LEGISLATIVE ACCOMPLISHMENTS

Under the leadership of the Advocacy Committee, NTC members were surveyed to prioritize the issues core to our mission. For the first time, the NTC registered lobbyists to help to respond to specific legislation:

- / NTC staff and members testified three times during this legislative session on these topics: Roundtable on Net Neutrality (Alex Curtis, NTC staff); Blockchain (Emily Vaughn, Change Healthcare); and Hearing on Data Breach (Alex Curtis and Steven F. Wood, Baker Donelson)
- Blockchain Legislation: The NTC worked to organize a coalition of the local tech community to amend and pass distributed ledger legislation through the General Assembly on March 8, 2018. The Governor signed the legislation into law on March 22, 2018.
- Data breach Legislation: The NTC worked in coalition with Tennessee tech businesses and associations to amend and finally block passage in the House as the bill was put on summer study March 13, 2018.



PROMOTION OF OUR TECH COMMUNITY

The NTC promotes our tech industry in the region and around the world. This includes leveraging relationships with the press to spread the word about member achievements, as well as evangelizing Middle Tennessee's tech community to a global audience.

COMMUNICATIONS

The NTC appreciated the opportunity to spot tech trends and provide input for Nashville Post's third annual "Techie" issue. The magazine launched at NTC's Tech Hill Commons and highlighted leaders in the Middle Tennessee tech industry.

ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT

The NTC and its members participated in several economic development trips. NTC President & CEO Brian Moyer traveled to Silicon Valley with representatives from the State of Tennessee, TVA, Nashville Mayor's office, Nashville Chamber and Williamson Inc. While there, they met with tech leaders and innovators to highlight the benefits of the Middle Tennessee creative tech scene and encourage investment and expansion to in our region.

Brian and several NTC member companies were part of an 85-person Nashville Chamber Leadership Study Mission that traveled to Seattle where the group met with Seattle leaders to learn from their experiences with technology innovation, transit, workforce development and education.

Brian and other members of the NTC took part in the maiden voyage of the BA direct flight from Nashville International Airport to London, England. The trip was an opportunity to build trade relations with the tech community in the UK. There are a growing number of Nashvillebased tech companies that have a presence in the UK. We intend to leverage the new direct flight to strengthen ties with the UK and establish regular trade missions between our two regions.

Additionally, the NTC met with representatives from more than twenty states and eight other countries on building relationships around tech development.



THE NASHVILLE TECHNOLOGY **COUNCIL FOUNDATION**

The Nashville Technology Council Foundation (NTCF) was established in 2013 to raise funds to support the education and workforce development efforts and programs of the Nashville Technology Council. As an IRS designated 501(c)(3) charitable organization, the NTCF expands the opportunities of the NTC to connect to a broader and more diverse group of funders in support of technology programs.

The NTCF raises funds to support technology-related education and talent development. It is estimated that there are over 2,000 open tech positions at any given time in the Middle Tennessee area. Local colleges and universities graduate about 1,300 new tech grads each year but have available space in their programs to educate more. The average tech worker earns about 66% more than a non-tech worker, making jobs in technology an attractive alternative in a low-unemployment, competitive marketplace.

To introduce and nurture interest in technology careers among area elementary, middle, and high school students, the NCTF funds a variety of programs, including one-week summer tech camps throughout the region, an eight-week camp in partnership with the Metro Action Commission, Traveling Tech Day field trips that bring students and teachers to businesses and college campuses, Hour of Code sessions where industry volunteers demystify computer coding, and a Technology Lending Library that brings Chromebooks and robotics to classrooms.

For college students, the NTCF helps to facilitate and support internships with area technology companies and IT departments.

In June 2018, the NTCF launched Apprenti TN, the first registered apprenticeship program in the Southeast. With the support and leadership of dedicated staff, the Apprenti TN program screens candidates for tech aptitude and matches them for careers in technology with hiring partners in the greater Nashville area. The program consists of intense, three-to-six month training to prepare the apprentices, and then one year of on the job training experiences.

Without the support of the NTCF and many generous donors and mission partners, the NTC would not be able to provide many of the educational and talent development programs it offers.

MISSION PARTNERS

Mission Partners provide critically important support for the NTCF through multi-year commitments at the \$5,000, \$10,000, \$20,000 and \$50,000 per year levels. These investments are the foundation of the support NCTF is able to offer to the NTC. Without the generosity and leadership of the NTCF Mission Partners, much of the work of the NTC would not be possible.

WORKFORCE DEVELOPMENT **& TECHNOLOGY EDUCATION**

CREATIVE TECH ECOSYSTEM

Even with almost 125,000 college and university students in Middle Tennessee, only 6,000 undergraduate and graduate students are enrolled in tech-related majors in our local colleges and universities. We are focused on increasing those numbers each year through directed outreach and technology programs with students as young as third grade. The work needs to start early to get kids interested in tech and future tech careers if they are going to be interested in filling those college program seats. It is critical for the NTC and our partners to provide students with the context for the technology careers available in Middle Tennessee.



SUMMER TECH CAMPS

We Build Tech Camps allow students to learn the basics of coding and robotics in one-week summer programs. The inspiring curriculum immerses students in an engaging, real-world environment in which they are challenged to create with code. By giving students the resources needed for success, we lay the groundwork that empowers them to become workforce leaders.

// IMPACT

During the summers of 2017 & 2018, the NTC hosted 17 technology camps, enrolling a total of over 300 students in grades 3-12. To date, the camps have reached almost **900** students.

TRAVELING TECH DAYS

Traveling Tech Days bring groups of students and teachers to local businesses and college campuses to learn more about careers and education in the field of technology.

// IMPACT

Thirty-seven different companies and colleges participated in 21 Traveling Tech Days throughout the year, bringing almost **300** middle and high school students and teachers to tech workplaces and campuses in Middle Tennessee. To date, nearly 1,100 students have experienced an NTC Traveling Tech Day.

SUMMER YOUTH TECHNOLOGY CAMP

The NTC partners with the Metro Action Commission to provide the Summer Youth Technology Camp. The camp targets youth ages 13-15 who are older siblings of Head Start children. Nashville Technology Council provided instructors and curriculum for the nine-week camp, which was held at American Baptist College. The students began the summer learning how computers and the internet work, then moved into basic web development and cybersecurity. The students also focused on improving their communication skills, working in teams, problem-solving abilities, and critical thinking skills to become the 21st Century workforce that our local employers need.

// IMPACT

The nine-week camp was attended by 24 high school students who traveled to 18 workplaces for on-site field trips that exposed them to technology workplace environments, cultures, and technology professionals.



HOUR OF CODE

As part of the global Hour of Code movement, the Nashville Technology Council partnered schools with local technology professionals during Computer Science Week. Hour of Code events demystify computer coding and show that anybody can learn the basics. Hour of Code also helps to broaden interest and participation in the field of computer science.

// IMPACT

December 3-9, 2017, almost 2500 students across Davidson and Williamson counties participated in Hour of Code events, creating new interest in technology and coding. Students and teachers also learned about the variety and availability of technology careers in Middle Tennessee. A special thank you to the almost **90** industry professionals who volunteered their time to make Hour of Code possible for the NTC.

TECHNOLOGY LENDING LIBRARY

The NTC's Technology Lending Library is an opportunity for schools to borrow a class set of robots and devices for use their classrooms. Launched as a component of Hour of Code 2016 with Sphero, Dash and Dot robots, this year emids generously donated 80 Chromebooks and 3-D Technology Group donated 10 iPads to support teachers, media specialists, and industry partners teaching kids how to code.

// IMPACT

To date, over **2500** students have learned to program using our robots.

WE BUILD TECH

APPRENT ΤN

The Nashville Technology Council Foundation (NTCF) launched Apprenti TN, the first technology apprenticeship program in Tennessee, in June 2018. Unlike traditional job-training options, Apprenti TN combines education and paid on-the-job training for placement in a high paying, high-skill occupation. The program works with tech employers to identify mid-tier jobs ready to be filled by highly competent people, regardless of educational background.

Apprenti TN builds upon Nashville's current assets to offer a solution to close the tech skills gap. This program will partner with existing training providers to provide high quality, accelerated skill building. The classroom training period is 12-24 weeks depending on occupational track. The apprentice is then placed with a hiring partner for one year of paid on-the-job training. During those 12 months, they begin at a reduced training wage. The apprentice's salary increases over the 12 months of on-the-job training as competency increases.

While Nashville's technology job growth has been one of the fastest in the nation over the past five years, there are still as many as 2,000 technology job openings at any given time and Nashville continues to lag the national average in terms of technology job concentration. The goal of Apprenti TN is to not only provide an additional source of tech talent, but to do so by bridging the 'opportunity gap' with underrepresented segments of our population who have the aptitude to learn a technical skill but have never had the opportunity.

Since launching in June 2018, there have been more than 350 people take the Apprenti TN assessment. Of those, 58% are people of color, 43% are veterans, and 23% are women. More than half of those that took the assessment scored over 80%, which gualifies them to move on to the interview phase. We are encouraged by these early results and fully expect Apprenti TN to have a significant impact in building a more inclusive tech workforce.

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
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
